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## The Good ol' Days Stephen Hassler

After college, in my first office job in the big city, the small talk my coworkers and I would exchange were topics of where we were born, where we went to school, and where we were 'brought up', among other things. I was then, and am now, proud of my rural upbringing on a farm. So at times I would relate the often difficult chores of feeding pigs, chickens, cows, calves, in cold Winters and in hot Summers.

I remember trying to chop through the Winter's ice in the cows' watertank (we didn't have heated tanks), and trying to re-light the small kerosene lamps beneath the pigs' drinking trough. It was difficult striking a match while wearing two pairs of gloves (I wore my father's clothes over my own), and one time I noticed that I had allowed my glove to catch on fire.

It seemed as if every morning in January and February was 20 degrees below zero. But that was in northeast Nebraska, not the temperate southeastern part of the state where I live now. Back then my world was without running water or telephone, and with a one-room schoolhouse half a mile from home with outhouses and an outdoor well for pumping water, plus occasional water in the basement from the overflow of the nearby 'crick'.

My dad and I moved irrigation pipe from one row of corn to over 18 or more rows to a dry row for several additional hours of watering. We didn't have the large, mechanically-propelled, metal monsters seen in fields these days. Late in the season when the corn was tall, even taller than my junior high height, I had to push and balance the 20 foot aluminum, 4 inch pipe (with my finger-tips), over the corn tassels and 'catch' it in the next row. And the corn leaves almost cut my arms, leaving scratch marks when I didn't wear a long-sleeved shirt. Of course, the hotter it was, the more we had to irrigate, moving the pipe early in the morning and again late in the afternoon so that the water could run all day and all night.

But I enjoyed relating stories that sounded unbelievable; if the chickens didn't get enough calcium supplements (powdered oyster shells), we would occasionally find an egg without a shell, enclosed only by a delicate membrane. No one would believe there could be eggs without shells.

My favorite story was how you could hear the corn grow. No one believed that either. I wonder how many farm kids experience that today? Sometimes when a field close to the house was in corn, on a quiet night when the wind wasn't blowing, you could hear the 'click', 'click' of the corn stalks pushing upward, growing. The sound was like chewing on a stalk of celery. Maybe that story would be easier to believe if one knew that a corn plant can grow several inches in a day, and standing within a few hundred feet of thousands of plants, the multiple growth spurts sound like the wind bending the stalks... when there is no wind!

Real life experiences are often unbelieveable. YouTube is full of them. (YouTube even has a video describing corn growing!) Someone ought to upload an audio. Anyway, there are many stories remembered of my growing up on a farm. And some of them would be hard for me to believe as well, if I hadn't lived them myself.



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
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## Poetry by Devon Adams

#### PORK CHOPS AND POEMS



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
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


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We'll be seeing more of this wildflower along 136, 75, & 67 in August.

For three hours now I've been sitting in my screened porch keeping vigil over the wren house fifteen feet away. The wren parents have been frenetically catching and delivering moths and other delicacies to the little ones inside. This past week, we've been hearing the nestlings' faint cheeping from deep inside the house. Today it is noticeably louder, owing to the fact that the babies have moved to the "top bunk," as it were, and are perched atop the pile of nesting sticks just inside the opening.

Their tiny, pointy beaks pop out and in like the tip of a ballpoint pen. Occasionally one will poke its entire head out of the hole and look around with a few quick jerks before retreating inside to safety.


Meanwhile, the parents alternate between two exhausting extremes: attempting to coax their offspring to leave the house, and furiously warning them to stay put whenever a blue jay appears.

A few days ago, I witnessed first-hand the carnivorous behavior of a blue jay. It had nabbed a young house finch and was stabbing it with its beak in the grass just beneath the wren house. I intervened, but it was too late: the little finch was done for. As soon as I turned my back, the jay returned, plucked up its prey, and flew off with it, no doubt to feed its own young. Such is the reality of survival of the fittest. If one desires to observe wildlife, it is best not to be overly sentimental about the fate of individual critters.

As I write this, one adult wren is delivering a morsel to the young while the other is chattering insistently. A cardinal joins the alarm; it has a nest of its own nearby that I am also monitoring. The female is incubating four eggs in a nest in the Viburnum shrub, right at my eye level. Together, the cardinals and wrens have mounted numerous defensive maneuvers against the blue jays. It seems the rest of the birds are content to let the cardinals and wrens do all the work. (I guess birds and humans are alike in that respect.)

It's a great luxury to be able to sit here in my porch all afternoon, hoping to witness the young wrens' exit from their house. I paid my dues this morning, mowing for two hours, so I feel no guilt about indulging in a few hours of birding. As I've been sitting here, a young oriole has visited the plants on my patio seeking lunch, and a (luckier) little finch – still fluffy with downy feathers – has come to bathe and drink. It's 100 degrees by my thermometer. I can only imagine the temperature inside the wren house.

The heat has brought down a hush and stillness over the neighborhood, yet the wrens' dedication to their duty has not diminished. I wonder if they marvel at the miracle of their own existence. Most people would pooh-pooh the very suggestion. But in their way, perhaps these tiny dynamos of the bird world have some grasp of their part in the vast scheme of things.
