Mainstreet Bank Collaborates with Peru State Art Students to Create New Seal

Peru State art students enrolled in Art 333, Design Studio, worked closely with Mainstreet Bank to develop a new seal for the rebranded bank. The students worked to combine meaningful symbols from the Bank's 100-year history and its role in Nebraska business and agriculture.

The medallion has two dates. The first, May 1, 1890, is the date of the bank's founding. The second, June 1, 2017, is the date of the bank's renaming to Mainstreet Bank. Mainstreet Bank was formerly known as Farmers Bank of Cook.

Joyce Douglas writes, "I loved working with the students. They were unbelievably creative." Douglas is the Vice Chairman of the Mainstreet Bank Board and Vice President of the Bank. She also serves on the Peru State College Foundation Board.

Andrew Smith (Auburn, NE) writes, "Working alongside my colleagues within the 2018 Design Studio allowed me the great opportunity to lend my skills and ideas to create something that will last forever. Our clients over at Mainstreet Bank were such a pleasure to collaborate with, and the work that we all put in truly shows." Smith continues, "I am grateful for the invitation to the medallion unveiling. Seeing the time and energy our Design Studio had put in come to fruition gave me an overwhelming sense of accomplishment and pride." Taylor Peterson (Blanchard, IA) adds, "Working alongside Mainstreet Bank to create such a memorable piece was truly a great opportunity. The entire experience was even better because I had the chance to collaborate with not only the Mainstreet Bank personnel but with my fellow peers."

In honor of the partnership with Peru State art students, Douglas announced a new scholarship for art students. A total of five \$1000 scholarships will be given, including two given to members of the design team not yet graduating and returning in the fall of 2019. Douglas adds that Rixstine Recognition in Lincoln was also key to the project's success. "Tim [Hoffman]'s staff worked with the final drawing to prepare the vector artwork so the foundry could prepare the final product."

Mainstreet Bank has seven locations in Nebraska including Cook, Peru, Louisville, Syracuse, Tecumseh, Virginia, and Wymore. A medallion was created for each location.

An eighth medallion was created to hang at Peru State College. It will be placed inside the new Performing Arts Center, outside the new Mainstreet Bank Lighting Booth. Peru State student involvement led to the inclusion of the Bobcat head at the bottom.

I am actually sitting in my screened porch writing this month's column. It's Easter Sunday afternoon and I'm being serenaded by the rippling song of romantic house finches, accompanied by an undertone of the cooing of mourning doves, the soft plunking of bamboo wind chimes and the constant wooshing of the wind through trees that are finally leafing out.

The wind has been gaining force all day, and I'm keeping my fingers crossed that we are not in for a storm this evening.

I spoke with my daughter in Georgia earlier this afternoon. On Good Friday, they were under a tornado watch and had some wind damage to a portion of their backyard fence. Mother Nature delivers both pleasure and problems. And often, a bit of humor.

Take our daughter and son-in-law's adventure with vermin recently. A tail of some critter or other poking out from under their riding lawnmower in the garage alerted our son-in-law to the presence of something peculiar. Our daughter thought it might be a possum. But, it was determined to remain under the mower, so they devised a plan to scare it out without harming it.

They placed a barricade of boxes along one side of the mower and then started the motor – being careful not to engage the blades. The critter, no doubt trembling with fear, still refused to budge. But a rev of the engine eventually convinced it to seek other shelter.

Our daughter said it shot out from under the mower, exited the garage and ran onto their front porch where it attempted to scale the wall. When that failed, it ran out into the yard, leapt about madly for a bit, and then ran off around the corner of the house.

Thinking About Lost Books

Today the spring weather beckoned me to clean, and my husband did some rearranging in the basement. He came across the small, college-dorm-sized 'frig we have that hasn't been opened since we moved last July. He checked inside. What's that green thing?! A moldy packet of beef jerky? No. It was the manual to the 'frig... almost unrecognizable. It must've been slightly damp when plopped in there for safe-keeping. Now it's useless. Not to mention gross.

It reminds me of the time a box of our books got damp. I didn't consider it a big loss because it was my husband's college textbooks from the 1970's. The smell of mildew made me nauseous; the dumpster became their fate. But it struck him as sad. A tangible piece of his youth was lost.

The thought of those damaged books reminds me of a photo I took of discarded reference books. I snapped it in the waiting room of a grimy auto repair shop.



During my wait I wrote a cinquain poem about it:

Old Reference Books ©2017
Haphazard piles
decaying
stacked up
like plague victims
in a narrow pauper's grave.

Mildewy books also remind me of the time our neighbor's basement flooded from a burst pipe. They were gone on a winter vacation and we had agreed to look after their house. When we discovered the water shortly after they left, we worked quickly to salvage photos, papers, and her wedding dress. Most of their items were in plastic tubs (thank goodness!), which taught me the value of investing in plastic instead of cardboard boxes.

The loss of books feels especially distressing because I love to read and I love libraries. I recently read "The Library Book" by Susan Orlean, which is about the Los Angeles Central Library fire of 1986. It was a devastating fire that injured 50 firefighters and damaged more than a million books. I had never heard of it before, and the book explains that the nuclear reactor melt-down in Chernobyl during the same time took all the press attention. Reading it made me appreciate the heroic efforts made by the librarians and volunteers to salvage whatever they could.

That book also made me think about Ray Bradbury's book, "Fahrenheit 451" about a society where all books have been outlawed and burned. I barely remember the details since I read it so long ago, but I recall the shock I felt at the thought of burning perfectly good books. And losing their vast stores of knowledge.

"Salvaging whatever they could" reminds me of the current flooding in the Midwest. I'm lucky to be living on high ground, but photos of houses and farms submerged break my heart. Livestock and farmland have been devastated, homes ruined, books and photos and memorabilia gone. Lives were lost trying to rescue others or simply trying to escape. In her book, Orlean quoted an African saying, "When an old man dies, a library burns to the ground."

Somehow that makes the loss of each person who ever walked this earth seem larger to me. It makes me appreciate the words they left behind in the pages of books or in the stories told to their children. And it makes me want to preserve my own library. Not just my collection of beloved books, but the stories in my heart yet to be written down.

So.....what to do. The first word out of Hubby's mouth was poison. But I suggested we move one of the sonic sounders to their front door and see if that works. We'll have to shovel some dirt into the holes and check to see if they tunnel right through it. Most likely if they abandon this den, they'll dig another one nearby. Birthing happens around mid-May, so they need a secure den soon. They could just go dig a den a few feet to the south – in our mini-woodland –and we wouldn't mind. But I guess they like a grassy front yard, or maybe the proximity to the pond with its rock-lined edge is what they like.

I think I'll set up the trail cam to monitor the den and see what happens. Stay tuned for further adventures with critters.

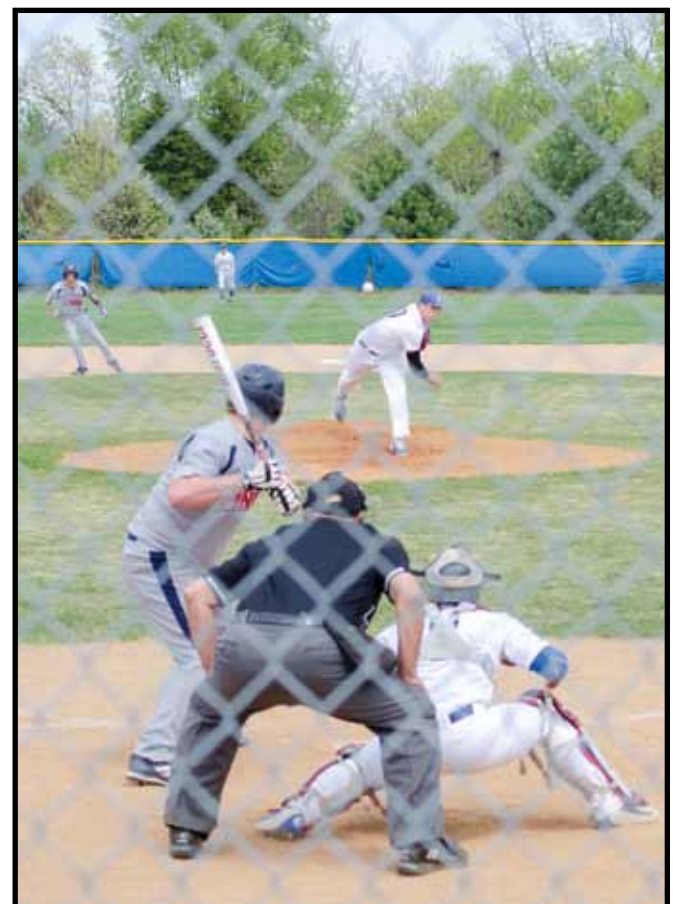
